



Our current herd includes 16 equines, 15 horses and one mule! Of these, five are mares and 11 are geldings.



## Did you know?


Horses come to serve in our programs in a variety of ways:

- Horses can be donated to us. We are a 501c3 and the value of your donation is tax-deductible.
- Horses can be leased to us as a "free lease". In this case, you retain ownership while your horse is with us. All cares are paid for by We Can Ride.

We take great pride in the standard of care our equines receive, including:

- Veterinary care, both routine and emergency through our partnership with the University of Minnesota
- Appropriate nutrition, supplementation and medication, continuously reviewed
- Tack fitting 4x annually
- Regular conditioning outside of class and monitoring "stress scores" to adjust workload as needed
- Heated stalls if needed, daily turnout, wellmaintained summer pasture







# Herd Spotlight

#### McDreamy's Story

Former thoroughbred race horse McDreamy came to We Can Ride in 2018. Having won over \$50,000 in purses on the track, he was a winner from the start. Still, he seems to have found his true calling as a therapy horse. His goofy personality and curious nature has endeared him to all who cross his path. Education Manager Michelle Haury calls him tho most optimistic horse she's ever worked with.



In December of 2024, in a freak accident, McDreamy hit his head on a wood beam in his paddock shelter and fractured his orbital bone.

Equine Operations Manager Tabea Brockman wrote, "We made the trip to the University of Minnesota for a CT scan to see the full extent of the damage. I can't even begin to explain how grateful I am to have such an incredible facility so close to us. The technology they have is amazing, and the team there truly cares.

Unfortunately, the scan confirmed our worst fears. The damage was too severe, and the best option for Dreamy's comfort and long term well-being was to remove his eye.


The amazing thing about animals though, is how resilient they are. They don't dwell on what's missing, they just adapt and move forward. It's us humans who often struggle to let go and look past what we see as a 'disability'. Dreamy doesn't see himself as any less whole and I know he'll thrive, as he is a pro at his job."

McDreamy's recovery is going very well! He is adapting fabulously and seems curious about his limited field of vision. From the day he arrived back at the barn he had a community tending to his wound, alleviating his boredom and scratching his itches during his stall rest, giving him extra long massage and bodywork sessions, and supporting him in every way possible.

He began his reign as 2025 Horse of the Year as he has always been...goofy, optimistic, adaptable, loved, and whole.
